residents and enjoy a free lunch.

- Attended the Village Market month. Spoke with the stallholders and residents who were visiting. Good to see everybody. No one reported any issues or concerns.
- The Market was remarkably busy again this month. Shared information and details of upcoming events.

Whitehorse Court:

• We went to see the residents at Whitehorse Court. Everyone was very welcoming. We took part in their weekly quiz, again we did not win!!

Journey, Autism and SEN (Special educational needs) Group:

 We held the Journey group again at the library. We had a new guest arrive with her two sons. The two boys settled in well and enjoyed the library experience. The Mother was happy to attend and will come along again in the future.

St. Mary's Church Café:

- We made our regular visit to the Church to meet our residents and have a chat. We met the new Rector,
 Jonathan Swindells. The Rector and the Church presented us with a donation of £1000.00 which was so
 generous, their support has been unwavering throughout our time in Storrington and Sullington. These
 funds will go towards the Summer Fun Day for the community. A massive thanks to the Church.
- Second visit of the Month to St. Marys. We wanted to invite some of the Parishioners to our upcoming lunch event as a thank you for the continued support.



Mother and Toddler group:

• We paid a visit to the Mother and Toddler group this month. They had a really good turnout of Mums and children. The volunteers were all in good spirits. We have informed the group of upcoming events.

Community Café: (previously Dementia café)

• Great turnout at the Café this month. Largest group to date, three new faces. Big thanks to Storrington Library for hosting this event.

Cuppa and a Chat:

• We held our monthly Cuppa and a Chat at the Leisure Centre, good turnout as usual. We have been talking to the Prevention Assessment Team (PAT) who want to get involved and help with residents in the rural areas with medical and financial advice The Team Leader Nurse, Annalise Garner kindly came down to offer blood pressure tests and discuss any medical concerns any of the group had. Our group really appreciated Annalise's time and support. We will be looking to work more with the P.A.T in the future.





Speed Watch:

- Assisted the Speedwatch team along Pulborough Road. Roads quiet, due to half term.
- Assisted the Speedwatch team along Amberley Road.

Rotary Club:

- The Wardens assisted the Rotary Club at the Village Hall with their lunch for the elderly community in Storrington. We had three Year 6 students along with their teacher from Thakeham Primary School to help with serving and collecting the finished plates. It was lovely to see many of our residents having a hot meal and a catch up. Big thanks to the students and their teacher.
- Visited the Rotary Club at their Book Fair. Discussed up and coming projects with them.

Autism and SEN weekly all sports event:

- Another great session at the Leisure Centre, we had a Mother and her daughter attend for the first time. 05.02.2025. 15 Children attended.
- We freshened up some of the activities. As we had use of the whole hall we had a football session. Really good fun. 12.02.2025. 10 Children attended.
- The event is still going strong. Some parents remarked on how much they had missed it when it was half term and no session took place. 26.02.2025. 13 Children attended.

Dungeons and Dragons Gaming Club:

• The Storrington and Sullington/Pulborough Wardens hosted our second event on the eighth at the Parish Hall. Our Dungeon Master brought along a friend of his to function as a second Dungeon Master due to the amount of young people attending. This event has been very well attended, the young people are enjoying

themselves and learning new skills. The feedback we are receiving from parents is amazing. Some of the comments are "It's lovely to get the kids away from computer screens for a couple of hours" and "Our son is meeting new people which is good for his social skills and confidence."



Storrington and Sullington Wardens in partnership with the Pulborough Wardens held our third session of
the Dungeons and Dragons gaming club. This was still well supported by the children and their parents. The
parents told us how excited the children are when they are getting ready to come. We have two more
sessions to run and will then decide how often we are able to play Dungeons and Dragons. Oscar and Henry
(Dungeon Masters) have been brilliant with the children, we have been so lucky to have them running the
games.

Youth engagement:

• Two young residents along with their grandparents litter picked the library/North Street Car Park this month. They were rewarded with biscuits. Lovely to see young people caring about their community.



Vulnerable residents' welfare check:

• Visited two or our elderly residents to check if they were ok. One of which has been in poor health recently.

- Responded to a resident who was having problems with her telephone and television. We advised her to speak to her service provider as there seemed to be a problem with her connection.
- We were contacted by the Glebe Surgery who were having difficulty making contact with a patient. We paid this lady a visit to make sure she was ok. She had no health concerns but was a bit tearful. She has her best friend living with her but wants to get out more. We have invited her to our next Cuppa and a Chat event. We are able to collect her in the Minibus. We will check on her again next week.
- Visited resident for a chat to see if they were ok after coming out of hospital.
- Had a chat with one of our elderly residents. Her husband is not in the best of health so tried to reassure her.
- Met with an elderly resident who wanted information about events she could attend. She was given some of our flyers for Cuppa and a Chat, Community Café and details of the upcoming lunch event we are holding in partnership with AgeUK.
- Booked a further four residents to attend the lunch event. This will be held at Chanctonbury Leisure Centre at the end of March. We are working in partnership with AgeUK to deliver this event.

Parish specific/other

Councillor Meetings:

- Met with Councillor Loney to discuss Storrington Primary Road Safety poster competition and the data collected on Spierbridge Road/North Street.
- Attended the Parish full Council meeting. We gave an update on new projects the Wardens are working on.
- Meeting at Chanctonbury Leisure Centre with Councillor to discuss plans and works to be conducted regarding The Community Garden Project.
- Met with our Councillor, Assistant Clerk, and the Leisure Centre Director at the Leisure Centre. The meeting
 was with the Storks & Nature event group. Plans are being made to host an event at the Leisure Centre on
 May 5th. Lots of work to do but extremely exciting for the Village.
- Met with organiser of the above event. She asked if we would meet with the volunteers that will be doing the marshalling on the day of the event.

Makaton Training:

• We were funded by the Sports and Leisure team at Horsham District Council to attend Makaton Training (Sign Language). Sessions include discussing commonly asked questions, hints and tips for effective signing and symbol use and how to start using Makaton in everyday situations at home or work. We both passed the two sessions attended and hope this will be of use when working in the community.



Charitable Donation:

A local group who performs in a band contacted the Wardens about making a donation. The Storrington
Music Club as they are known as donate money to all things Storrington. We met with the group and told
them of the projects we are working on. They were keen to help and generously donated £500 to the
Sensory Dome project which will be a big aid to Autistic and SEN children. We cannot thank them enough
and look forward to watching them live!!

School Engagement:

- Visit to Rock Road Campus. Some of the students had arranged a tour of the school. Great to see everyone, they are all looking forward to Half Term.
- Lunchtime visit to Rock Road Campus. It was good to talk to some of the pupils that come to our Dungeons and Dragons gaming club. The enthusiasm for the club and excitement for the next date is great.
- Third visit to Rock Road Campus, nothing further to report.
- We went to Storrington Primary School to present the prizes for the Safer Roads Poster Competition that we
 organised. The aim of the competition is to use posters that the students had drawn around the Village to
 warn drivers of the need to slow down and be more considerate to pedestrians and other drivers. The school
 was delighted with the results as were the runners up and winners of the Competition. A great effort by the
 whole school.

Hazards and Risks:

• We recently visited an elderly resident, she lives alone. We have arranged for the Fire Service to pay her a visit and to check her property and do a safe and well visit to check on smoke alarms etc.

Safer Roads Vehicle Survey:

• We have been working with one of our Parish Councillors and West Sussex County Council's Road Safety Officer. We have completed the survey during half term. The object of the exercise is to survey streams of traffic coming in and out of Spierbridge Road. The objective will be to find solutions to improve road safety for children and reduce traffic flow through the Village. We monitored the traffic on three separate occasions throughout one day. Traffic coming and going through Spierbridge Road/North Street. In total we have monitored the traffic over fifteen separate sessions.


